CRUMBLE and SLICE: The nature of the Russo-Ukrainian War

Borys Gengalo, as the resident UGG military specialist, made an earlier presentation on February 22, 2022 on the ongoing Russo-Ukrainian War. This presentation was an update on the current military situation in Ukraine.

Borys began his analysis with the Russian escalation of the war in February, 2021 when they attacked Ukraine from various directions. The Ukrainians stopped the Russians north of Kyiv, near Kharkiv, Luhansk and began to push them back. The Ukrainian counter-offensive also began in Kherson region. After the initial advances by the Russians, the Ukrainians held their ground and developed new defensive tactics. The Russians used 'human-wave' tactics in their attempts to overwhelm the Ukrainian positions but this resulted in massive

casualties among the Russians. This was particularly evident in the battles for Bakhmut and Avdiivka in eastern Ukraine. In the south, the Ukrainians were confronted by a series of obstacles prepared by the Russians – trenches, extensive mine fields, barbed wire, dragon teeth. The Ukrainians began their 'crumble and slice' tactics towards Tokmak and they were able to establish a 'beach head' across the Dnipro River.

This advance was in preparation for further penetration towards Crimea. Borys explained the importance of Crimea to Ukraine in the war to defeat the Russians. The Kerch Strait remains an important passage for exports from the Donbas for manufactured products and grain. Crimea has been extensively militarized by the Russians and will always be a threat as a 'launch-pad' against Ukraine.

Borys explained in detail the various equipment and armaments that are used to defend Ukraine and repel the Russians. Since minefields are particularly important Russian defensive weapons, several technical methods are used by the Ukrainians to defeat these obstacles. Borys also commented on the need for air defence, aircraft, vast amounts of ammunition, drones and rockets. Some of the weapons are supplied by the United States but their use against the Russian military is restricted to the Russian-occupied areas of Ukraine.

Borys also commented on issues relating to training, leadership, community support, morale, and motivation. He mentioned some criticism about the Ukrainian strategy by foreigners and stated that much of the Ukrainian advances against the Russians are

dependent on overwhelming air power and air supremacy. According to the Ukrainian military leadership, Ukraine has an urgent need for more artillery, air support, electronic warfare and new battle tactics to defeat the Russians that are continually mobilizing more soldiers to send to Ukraine. The future of military operations depends very much on additional military material from the United States and this has become a serious political problem in the United States and therefore, in Ukraine.

The presentation was followed by a question and answer session.

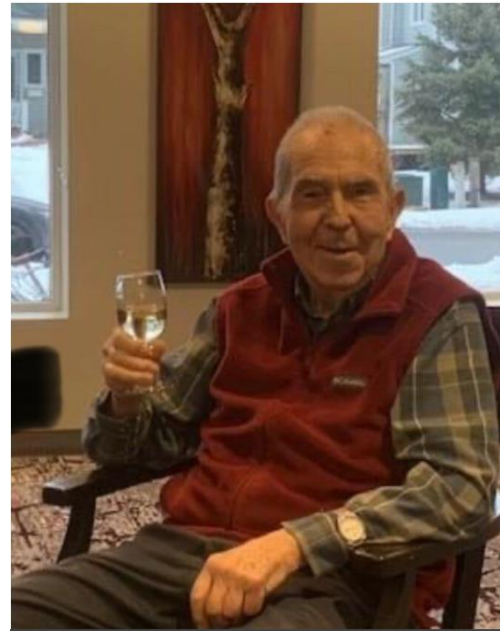
