Jan 24 2017 Meeting

'Modern Ukraine's Greatest Churchman, Andrey Sheptytsky: Genealogy, Achievements and Controversies'

Fr. Peter Galadza spoke on "Modern Ukraine's Greatest Churchman, Andrey Sheptytsky: Genealogy, Achievements and Controversies". Fr. Galadza spoke about the life and church career of Met. Andrey Sheptysky (1865-1944) beginning with a short history of his family whose noble origins date to the early medieval period in western Ukraine.

Members of the Sheptytsky family were prominent in the political and religious life of Halychyna for generations and acquired many of the characteristics of the Polish nobility in the last centuries, for example, they became members of the Roman Catholic Church and spoke French at home

Andrey Sheptytsky returned to the Church of his ancestors and became Archbishop of the Greek Catholic Church in Halychyna. In this position, he visited the pioneer Ukrainian communities in

Canada twice, in 1910 and after the First World War.

He corresponded with the Greek Catholic clergy in Canada and provided guidance and advice. Because of his position as leader of the Church and as Exarch, he was drawn into the controversial politics in western Ukraine during the First and Second World Wars. He provided shelter for Jews persecuted by the Nazis during the Second World War and, for his life and good works, plans were made to declare him as a Saint.

In case of the need to cancel meetings

There have been weather warnings in recent months and it was suggested that the UGG develop some procedures for members to follow in the event that a meeting must be cancelled on short notice. PROCEDURE: Starting with our next season in September 2017, all members are requested to check either their email or the UGG website on or after 3:00PM on the day of the meeting to verify that the meeting will be held as scheduled. Whenever a meeting is at risk of being cancelled, the UGG will send out a cautionary notice by email to all who are on our contact list outlining the situation. Updates will be sent as conditions evolve. However, if it is obvious that conditions will not improve after 3:00 p.m. on the day of the meeting, then a notice will be sent cancelling the meeting.
