know so that they can be included. In addition, we would like to know of other individuals that might be buried in other locations in the NCR so that they can be included in a separate listing. We will post a form on the web so that everyone will know what information is required and so that it can be sent to us in a standard format.

The new version of PAF v5 from the Church of Latter Day Saints, is proving to be another great release of the program. The greatest feature from my perspective is finally, the ability to use syrilin characters in the program! The Hamburg Emigration Lists are a data bank which includes the personal data of 5 million people who emigrated via Hamburg from 1250 to

1934. It is now available for your personal use, starting with the years 1890-1893.

This data bank will then grow, on a regular basis, year by year. The first phase will include the data on emigrants from 1890 to 1914. At a later date the years 1850 to 1934 will be included and all of it will be accessible on the internet as well. As soon as you've found the name you are looking for you may obtain complete details (where they came from profession, age, etc.).
