<u>Summary of November Presentation by Frank J</u> <u>Cedar</u>

Frank was born in Ottawa and received most of his education here, except for graduate school at the University of Alberta in Edmonton, where he received his doctorate in Chemistry. He spent 25 years as a federal public servant dealing with the regulation of pesticides, retiring from that activity 7 years ago. Frank's genealogy interests encompass two areas of research: (1) his own Wojtowicz family history, including the immigration of his grandparents from Galicia to Saskatchewan in 1903 and 1905; and, (2) the genealogical links of the Polish community of Brandon, Manitoba to the village of Kaszyce, Poland. In June 2003, Frank visited Chicago to meet with, for the first time, a number of "displaced" Polish Canadians from Brandon. Manitoba. He gleaned much history of the Brandon Polish community from them. They continue to exchange information, assist one another and this will lead to another Chicago trip in 2004. In September 2003 Frank revisited Poland and Ukraine for the second time.

A whirlwind of visits to area Archives, USC Offices and churches resulted in a wealth of family history data. In Kaszyce, Poland, he acquired a copy of the "Status Animarum", which lists all the Roman Catholic parishioners by family in the village. Each House Number is listed on a separate page. In Polish, this book is called "Spis Ludnosci" (List of People). A copy was circulated for viewing during his November UGG talk.

A cousin from Ukraine (Andriy Ryzhyj) joined Frank in Przemysl and they then visited their Wojtowicz relatives in Zablotce, a smaller neighboring village to Kaszyce. Relatives gave them an excellent driving tour of the SE corner of Poland where they viewed many 15th century wooden churches. Frank was made aware of the Land Registry system used in Poland and visited the local office in Jaroslaw. Andriy and Frank took the bus (3 hours) from Przemysl to L'viv, Ukraine. This time the border crossing was much more efficient. Elapsed time at the border was only one hour versus five hours 3 years ago. The weather was superb and Frank spent

much time walking around L'viv and feeling quite comfortable being there. Andriy accompanied Frank to the L'viv Archives where they examined old Austrian Land Cadastral records for the years 1788, 1820 and 1853 plus a 1917 Accounting of WWI damage to Property. This WWI Accounting listed all property owners and was thus a useful source of genealogical information. A wealth of Wojtowicz names, dates and other data was easily gathered from these documents. Frank also found old Zablotce school records for his grandpa's two younger sisters. With this data, Frank was able to correct their birth dates. Staff at the L'viv Archives were very helpful. Frank stated that his visit to Ukraine was all too short. He plans to visit another time.

While in Poland and Ukraine, Frank purchased a number of maps and books, a number of which he donated to the UGG library. For those who are looking for genealogy researchers in Przemysl and L'viv, here are two possible contacts:

Both contacts are students, fluent in English and familiar with the genealogical records. Their rate for research is \$5 US per hour, but please confirm before making a commitment. For additional information on either researcher, please contact Frank Cedar at cedar@sympatico.ca

During his presentation, Frank emphasized the importance of local contacts including family members in locating and using local archival sources. Knowledge about the local 'paper-trail' is also important since local records may be located in neighboring towns and villages.

Alexandra Opar concluded the meeting with a presentation on her research relating to her ancestral village in the Carpathian Mountains. Alexandra was able to obtain some interesting census information from contacts in Lviv. Researchers who are interested in further information may contact Alexandra.

Ukrainians Abroad

On November 19, 2003, the Parliament of Ukraine passed a new law defining the legal status of Ukrainians abroad. According to this new law, Ukrainians living in the 'diaspora' can now acquire that status of 'Zakordonnoho Ukraintsia" that is, Ukrainian Abroad or literally, Ukrainian living outside the borders of Ukraine, if they are of Ukrainian ethnic descent or emigrated from Ukraine.

According to this law, the Ukrainians Abroad share in the same rights and obligations as Ukrainian citizens but are excluded from some political rights such as voting, running for political office, service in the military, service in government and local administration. This law can include from 12 to 20 million Ukrainians living outside the territory of Ukraine. The law confirms that those Ukrainians living abroad are also part of the Ukrainian nation.

The new law will facilitate those who wish to study in Ukraine and also live in Ukraine permanently.
