On Participating in Alberta Community Projects

Janice Pelletier's presentation at out November meeting covered several topics of interest to our members. She began her presentation by briefly describing her family history in the Smoky Lake and Lac La Biche areas of Alberta. Although she was able to locate many references to the French Canadian side of her family for her 'family tree', her Ukrainian side had only a few names and that is a challenge in her research. She mentioned the Ukrainian Genealogy Project in Alberta that was initiated by the former Premier Ralph Klein in 2006:

Janice offered some words of advice for researchers engaged in group projects dealing, for example, with anniversary books. In this case, researchers should be prepared to devote much time to these projects and they may extend into months if not years. Compiling research information may also cause delays with honest mistakes, unverified testimonials and oral accounts. the dates and sources of information. Records may be investigated at various archival institutions and in the case of the St. Onuphrius Church, the Archives of the Canadian Museum of History is perhaps the best source. Another source for immigration records is the Pier 21 Immigration Museum in Halifax but researchers should contact the Museum to confirm that they are open to receiving inquiries in case there is major construction and renovation work that may delay replies. http://www.pier21.ca/home/

Researchers are encouraged to use business cards and publish brochures describing their projects to maintain contacts with institutions and individuals who may have relevant information. Researchers may be dealing with other researchers who are in some cases, volunteers. For large research projects, it may be necessary to hire professional researchers and be prepared to pay for this work. Janice circulated an information sheet with additional information on researching pioneer family history in Alberta. This list will be included in the next UGG Annual Report. The meeting concluded with Janice answering questions from the members.

Both sessions were informative and provided new avenues of research in Ukrainian family history. Yandex is the Ukrainian equivalent of Yahoo as a search engine. By searching your family name and name of the ancestral village in the Ukrainian alphabet, it is possible to locate interesting information from various sources.
