April Meeting

The topic for the April meeting was 'Ukrainian Canadian Coats of Arms'. We were very fortunate that B/Gen. (Ret'd) Isidore Popowych and Ron Sorobey agreed to make a presentation on this theme. Gen. Popowych stated that he became interested in this subject many years ago when he saw a Popowych Coat of Arms purchased in a shopping mall in Sudbury. The information stated that the Popowych family was of Polish origin and from Russia. He always wanted to correct this information and when he had the opportunity, he began to locate and record accurate information relating to his family name. His research led him to consult many reference books, libraries and Ukrainian experts in this field. When he concluded his research, Gen. Popowych was awarded his Coat of Arms by the Governor General on November 15, 2005.

Gen. Popowych's research took him to the dawn of Ukrainian history and in his presentation, he mentioned the Scythians, the Greeks colonies, Kyivan-Rus and the Cossack period. He traced the origins of the Tryzub (Trident) now the official symbol of Ukraine and there are two Tridents on his Coat of Arms. Other Ukrainian symbols include the Lion of Halychyna, a Ukrainian Cross and the blue and gold colours resembling the official colours of Ukraine. It also includes a Bulava which he received from the Ukrainian Armed Forces for his services as a Canadian Military Advisor. The Coat of Arms also included representations of his military medals and distinctions which reflected his profession as a pilot and military officer.

Gen. Popowych concluded his presentation by stating that he began this research to record his family history, to honour a legacy and his parents and to inspire future generations. The Coat of Arms provides at a glance, a permanent record of his family history, origins in Ukraine and his service to Canada. Ron Sorobey gave the second presentation on the Coats of Arms. He began his presentation by outlining the key elements of a Coat of Arms. He researched the origins of his family in the Chortkiw region of western Ukraine. He adopted heraldic symbols from the Chortkiw Coat of Arms which he incorporated in his own Coat of Arms. The colours on his Coat of Arms are also blue and gold. Also included were symbols relating to his career in the Canadian Public Service and his family roots in Manitoba. He displayed the Coats of Arms of various contemporary Ukrainian families in Ukraine. He stated that in his case, the process to acquire a Coat of Arms from the Herald took about a year. Ron Sorobey was granted his Coat of Arms by the Governor General on August 15, 2008. He concluded his presentation by mentioning the emotional reception by members of his family when he presented them with his Coat of Arms.
