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Satellites and Settlements

This presentation will discuss the use of satellite imagery in genealogy and the availability of these data. Many may have heard of Google Maps, Yahoo Maps, and MSN Virtual Earth but this is only the tip of the iceberg of what satellite and air photos are available on the WWW that may be of interest to the genealogy community.

For example, the Canadian government has purchased a complete satellite coverage of Canada that may be downloaded free of charge. Of course, these data are fairly recent (1990-2000 time frame). However, air photos from the National Air Photo Library date back to the 1920's.

In addition, NASA has purchased two complete global satellite coverages that are available either free of charge or for a nominal fee.

Examples of air photos of homestead areas in Manitoba, and ancestral areas in the Ukraine will be presented.

The presentation will also address what software is available for viewing and analyzing these data and linking these data to maps through GPS (Global Positioning Satellite) technology.

Revision of the Report on Alexandra Opar's Presentation at the September Meeting

Alexandra Opar described her experiences researching in local archives in Poland in the summer. She attempted to gain access to vital records in both a state archive and a City Hall in Poland. The local staff in both were friendly and cooperative especially after receiving little "gifts". She was able to view vital record books in the state archive (in Skolyszyn, Poland) but was not allowed to view the more recent vital record books in the City Hall though she could make requests for individual pieces of information at the City Hall.

She attended a Lemko festival ("Vatra") which attracted participants from Poland, Ukraine, Slovakia, Serbia and also Canada. She played some of the music from this festival. She also described her visit to the Lemko village of Volovets in the Carpathian Mountains.

Alexandra also visited her ancestral town in Western Ukraine. This area was the only area she visited but as such she was able to experience daily life in contemporary Ukraine. Living conditions are relatively rough. She also visited the local City Hall in this town in Ukraine. Vital records kept there were hit-andmiss.

Alexandra plans to visit Poland and Ukraine again to continue her research next summer.
