Ukrainian-Canadian Genealogy

As part of UGG-NCR's collaboration with the Nashi Predky Ukrainian Family History Group from New Jersey, the UGG Board developed a one-hour presentation last June focusing on the 3 waves of Ukrainian immigration to Canada with a representative sample of key resources that genealogists could use in researching their Ukrainian-Canadian ancestry.

We decided to kickoff our 2019-2020 UGG season by showing a video of this presentation to our members at our September meeting.

Our September Presentation

The 1st Wave (1891-1920) of immigration focused on the growing impoverishment in the Austro-Hungarian & Russian Empires as well as oppressive governments and military conscription as key "push" factors influencing Ukrainians to leave their homeland. During this time, the Canadian government sought to settle Western Canada with immigrants who could farm under difficult conditions and recruited farmers from several countries including Galicia and Bukovina. Life was extremely harsh – the growing season was short and there

was no government assistance. Newcomers had to rely on family and community support as well as part-time work in other industries.

The 2<sup>nd</sup> wave (1920-1939) similarly saw political, military, and economic uncertainty in Post-WWI Europe prompting Ukrainians to seek a better life in the West. Although some Prairie land remained to be settled, immigration increasingly focused on Eastern Canada in the growing cities as well as in the mining/forestry communities in the North. Despite economic growth in the early years, the Great Depression limited opportunities for immigrants in the 30s.

World War II created another wave of refugees and political exiles who were sent as forced labourers to work in Germany during the war. After the war, the 3<sup>rd</sup> Wave of immigration (1945-1954) saw many displaced persons seeking to leave Europe as a best alternative. The Canadian Government decided to allow Displaced Persons to immigrate to Canada under the 'Bulk Labour Scheme' as contractors on condition that they worked in designated industries for a year.

The presentation provided an overview of various Canadian genealogical resources which genealogists could use including various Library and Archives Canada resources. The talk also contrasted the Ukrainian immigration experience between Canada and the USA.

This year, the UGG is trialing new approaches such as webinars & remote presenters to expand our base of speakers as well as to allow remote attendance. This pre-recorded presentation as well as the live October presentation on Ukrainian-Americans by Mike Buryk from Pennsylvania are the first steps. More to come..

#### 3-Day Danyliw 2019 Seminar (Nov 7-9)
