Includes name, date, location, age, occupation, and crime. Some Ukrainian-origin names are included.

Crowsnest and Its People (Millennium Edition, 2000)

This local history with 964 pages includes information on families that lived and worked in the coal mining Crowsnest area of Alberta. There is an index of family names on pages 959 to 964 and among these families were many of Ukrainian origin.

A supplementary Index was compiled by Mary Boyle in 1987 and it is available in the Library and Archives Canada under the title, Index, Crowsnest and Its People (FC 3695 C76 C762 1987).

Ten Years of Cyndi's List

Perhaps one of the best sites for researching genealogy is Cyndi's List of Genealogy Sites (<http://www.cyndislist.com>) Cindi's List will be celebrating its tenth anniversary in March.

At first, the website consisted of one page and 1,025 links. Since then, Cindi's List has grown to more than 330 individual pages containing more than 258,300 links. The Main Category Index page receives more than 15,000 visits each day while the entire website receives 70,000 hits. On Cindi's List you will find everything with a genealogy connection. The Main Category Index lists topics in alphabetical order. Under Canada, you will find links for the 10 provinces, three territories, General Canada Sites and Canada Military. Noted beside the link is the number of links contained on that page and when it was last updated.

Like many websites, Cindi's List has a search engine (<http://www.cyndislist.com/searchit.htm>) to save hours of searching through hundreds of pages. However, the search engine searches for key words throughout Cindi's website and not the linked sites. There is also a 'No-frills' index for those with older or slower computers.

Families celebrate their centennial in east central Alberta

At the Ukrainian Cultural Heritage Village, near Edmonton, Alberta.

Mr. Edward Stelmach, MLA for Fort Saskatchewan-Vegreville, unveiled the newest plaques for the Centenary Monument on Sunday, August 13th, 2006, as descendants of pioneer families celebrated their centenary in east central Alberta.

Now in its fourth year, the Centenary Pioneer Recognition Program recognizes the pioneer families who immigrated to east central Alberta between the years 1891 and 1914. This annual program invites any descendants of pioneer

families who settled in east central Alberta 100 years ago and earlier to apply. Certificates recognizing each family are presented at the annual Ukrainian Day celebrations, held at the Ukrainian Cultural Heritage Village every year in August.

As a lasting tribute to the pioneer settlers in east central Alberta, a monument was erected in 2005 at the Ukrainian Cultural Heritage Village as an extension of the Centenary Pioneer Recognition Program. One year after certificates are issued, applicants are invited again to the Ukrainian Day celebrations, this time to witness the formal unveiling of their ancestors' names on plaques on the Centenary Monument. In many cases, names on the monument represent at least four generations of Albertans who settled in east central Alberta.

The goal of the program is to recognize all families and individuals who arrived and settled in east central Alberta between the years 1891 and 1914. As such, this program will run annually until 2014. As of this year, the program will be coordinated as part of the Alberta-Ukraine Genealogical Project.
