May 28, 2013 Meeting

Slavco (Sterling) Demchinsky gave a detailed and well-researched presentation on Early Ukrainian Canadian Churches. Slavco has been photographing and documenting Ukrainian churches of various denominations throughout Canada for several years. This presentation was based on this research as well as on a recent research trip to western Canada.

He began with an explanation of the basic shape of a church interior with the Sanctuary (alter area), Nave (main part of the building) and Narthex (entrance area). In many cases, the interior shape is in the form of a cruciform (cross shaped) or variations on this shape. He described the evolution of Ukrainian Church architectural styles in particular, vernacular styles of the Boyko, Lemko and Hutzul styles familiar in western Ukraine. Each style was distinguished by the general floor plan and the dome and roof styles. The interiors were decorated with icons and religious images and he mentioned the work of early iconographers from Ukraine.

The early pioneers built their wooden churches based on their experience and memory of churches in Ukraine. However they were limited by the availability of lumber in western Canada and, in some cases, did not have access to the large timbers similar to those that were available in the forested and mountainous areas of western Ukraine. As a result, they were obliged to use the local trees that, in some cases, proved to be inadequate.

Democracy at War: Canadian Newspapers and the Second World War.

During the Second World War, the staff of the Hamilton Spectator newspaper kept a newsclipping record of the war. This collection of more than 144,000 newspaper articles, manually clipped, stamped with the date, and arranged by subject, includes news stories and editorials from newspapers, mostly Canadian, documenting every aspect of the war.
